

A Recipe You Might Enjoy



It's a great time of the year to try this dish with so many fresh vegetables available. Marion Rhea Speaks shares her mother, Frances Durham Bradley's old Southern recipe for this veggie medley.

Garden Delight

3 medium sized potatoes

1 medium onion

2 medium green tomatoes

2 crook-necked squash

1 bag frozen breaded okra

1/2 cup shortening or vegetable oil

Directions:

Peel the potatoes and cut into 1 inch squares and fry in ¼ cup shortening until almost done. Cut the green tomatoes and squash into similar size pieces. Slice the onion into ¼ inch slices. Mix these ingredients into the skillet with the potatoes and continue frying until soft. In a separate skillet with the remaining shortening, fry the breaded okra until lightly browned. Add all ingredients together and continue frying until done.

Serve with some fresh ripe sliced tomatoes and your favorite main dish.







History of Our Older Churches

SHELLSFORD BAPTIST CHURCH

Attending church is an integral part of so many of our lives and I felt it would be good to do a series of history from several of our older congregations. The churches chosen are in no certain order and here is the first in this new series for the Newsletter.







I met with Don Yancy, chairman of the deacons, for a tour of the church property at 121 Bottoms Road, McMinnville. My intention was to hopefully copy a few older pictures and gather enough information for a short story. Thanks to Dan, he gave me a story on the church history written in 1993 by church member Zora

Waldrop. I couldn't have written it better.

A Brief History of THE SHELLSFORD BAPTIST CHURCH 1810-1993

The Shellsford Baptist Church, the largest rural congregation of Baptist in Warren County, has a membership in excess of 600. The Shellsford Church was established in 1810 when Rev. William Thompson and Rev. George Stubblefield came from the Blue Springs Baptist Church on Hickory Creek, near Viola, and held a brush arbor meeting near what was known as Buck Springs.

After the brush arbor meeting, a house of split logs, put together with wooden pegs, was built. The cabin supposedly had one door, two windows and a fireplace. It was used until about 1857 when it was replaced with a frame building. The original log church building was sold in 1861 for \$4.00.

The original name of the Shellsford Baptist Church was Buck Spring Baptist Church on the Collins River.

According to tradition, the spring for which the original church was named got its name because of hunting success at the location of pioneer settler Jordon Sellers. Sellers, who lived in the vicinity, would go to the spring and wait nearby in the early morning hours for deer to come and drink, then take

a bead on them down the barrel of his trusty rifle. He furnished his larder with so many deer from the site that, not only the spring, but the entire surrounding area became known as Buck Spring.

Shellsford was named for Christian Shell who owned and operated a mill only a short distance down the Collins River. Shellsford was one of the earliest settlements in Warren County, and sometime between 1820 and 1855 the name of the church was changed to the Baptist Church of Christ at Shellsford.

Organized as a Primitive Baptist Church, Shellsford was reorganized as a Separate Baptist and finally became a Missionary Baptist Church. Shellsford affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention in 1879 and remains as a member of the

religious body. It has belonged to several associations, and is now a member of the Central Association of Tennessee Southern Baptists.

Earliest minutes of the church have been lost or misplaced. Minutes, which the church now has, start with one entry for 1854, then go to January 1855. These continue until 1879, then skip to 1895 and continue to 1921. Records between 1921 and the early 1940s have been lost or misplaced. Minutes from 1943 to the present are complete. Each early entry, and on up to about 1950 begins "The Baptist Church of Christ met at Shellsford Saturday before the second Sunday..."

Shellsford originally met once a month, Saturday and the second Sunday; the Saturday session being held to conduct business and the Sunday gathering for worship. This practice continued until the 1930's when Sunday School was instituted on the every-Sunday basis but with preaching only on the Second and fourth Sundays. It became a full time, every-Sunday church shortly thereafter.

As with most churches in the early days, money was hard to come by and the preacher's salary, or whatever he received for his services, was by subscription on the part of church members. Records indicate the subscription of male members in 1870 was 25 cents a quarter with women paying 10 cents a quarter, or every three months.

It appears the first annual salary of a preacher at Shellsford was voted in 1909, the amount being \$100 a year.

Each time a new building was erected it was moved farther from the spring and closer to the main road. Today's church building is within sight of the Shellsford-Fairview Road.


