CALVIN CALHOON(C.H.) DYKES, THE SON CF SANDERS DYKES AND JANE LOCKHART DYKES, WAS BORN IN WARREN COUNTY TN. ON AUGUST 24,1842 AND DIED IN MARION COUNTY TN. SEPTEMBER 16, 1929. ON OCTOBER 13, 1861 AT THE AGE OF19, HE MARRIED NELLIE BIRCH COLESTON, THE 17 YEAR OLD DAUGHTER OF ALEXANDER (ALEX) COLESTON AND ABBIE MYERS COLESTON. SHE WAS BORN SEPTEMBER 8, 1844 AND DIED FEBRUARY 2nd 1928, AND WAS CALLED AUNT ELLEN BY MOST. C.H. CALLED HER ELLENDER.

CALHOON AND ELLENDER WERE THE PARENTS OF 13 CHILDERN AND RAISED THEIR FAMILY NEAR THE MARION AND GRUNDY COUNTY LINE, A PLACE CALLED DYKES HOLLOW.

HIS EARLIER CHURCH ACTIVITIES ARE NOT KNOWN. AT THE AGE OF 27 IN 1869, HE MET WITH A GROUP OF PEOPLE TO ESTABLISH THE PRIMITIVE BABTIST CHURCH OF FALL CREEK AND WAS APPOINTED CHURCH CLERK IN JANUARY OF 1870 AND SERVED AS CLERK UNTIL 1883. DURING THIS TIME HE TRAVLED TO SEVERAL SURROUNDING COUNTIES SERVING AS CLERK AND DELEGATE IN CHURCH CONFERENCES. HE WAS CRDAINED AS A DEACON OF THE CHURCH JULY 1882. IN GCTOBER OF 1883 C.H. AND SEVERAL MEMBERS LEFT THE MOTHER CHURCH TO ESTABLISH AN INDEPENDENT CHURCH NEAR TRACY CITY, TENN.

IN AUGUST OF 1888 HE WAS MODERATOR OF THIS CHURCH. DURING THESE YEARS
THE BABTIST AND METHODIST HELD CHURCH MEETINGS IN THE SAME BUILDING ON
ALTERNATE SUNDAYS. AT THE TURN OF THE CENYURY THE TWO DEMONIATIONS
JOINED HANDS TO BUILD A CHURCH BUILDING TO SHARE. C.H. PREACHED AT THE
CHURCH ON THEIR SUNDAYS AND PREACHED AT THE BROWN HOLLOW SCHOOL HOUSE
ON ALTERNATE SUNDAYS.

THIS CHURCH IS KNOWN AS THE ORANGE HILL CHURCH, A MODERN BUILDING STANDS NOW JUST BEHIND WHERE THE CRIGINAL CHURCH STOOD, AND IS STILL SHARED BY THE CONGERATION OF THE BABTIST AND THE .ETHODIST ON ALTERNATE SUNDAYS. C.H. AND HIS WIFE ELLENDER ALONG WITH MANY OF THEIR KIN REST IN THE ORANGE HILL CEMETARY NEAR THE CHURCH.

She was born Sep 8, 1844, died Feb 2, 1928, buried Orange Hill Cemetery, daughter of Alexander and Abigail (MYERS) COULSON.

Thomas Dykes was the son of Thomas Dykes of Cumberland Co., England, and his wife, Isabel, the only child of John Pennington of Muncaster Castle, the twelfth generation from Gamel de Penington who was living during the reign of Henry II of England (1154-1189) and who founded the Conishead Priory and founded his home on the Esk River near the old Roman fort of Glamma Venta. The Muncaster Castle at Ravenglass, in Cumberland County, is presently occupied by Mr. & Mrs. Patrick Gordon Duff-Pennington. Patrick was an honored guest at the Pennington Reunion in Charleston, S.C., in 1986. His wife Phyllida descends from John Pennington's brother, William, who died in battle in 1533. On the walls of Muncaster hangs the large oil painting of Thomas Skelton, the Jester of Muncaster, with his Last Will and Testament. John Pennington died in 1516. His wife Mary, daughter of Sir John Huddleston, and he were members of the King's household in London.

Thomas Dykes, b. ca. 1510, and his wife Isabel Pennington, b. ca. 1515/16, may have had several children. Their son, Thomas, is recorded in the Sussex and Kent Visitations. He was b. ca. 1540/50 and was created Baronet of Sussex and Kent through marriage by Elizabeth I of England. By his first wife whom he married in 1574 he had: John; Robert, b. ca. 1577, m. ca. 1600, Ann, daughter of Nicholas Starkey of Cheshire. They had: John, Charles, Thomas, Judith and Elizabeth. Their 3rd son was Thomas, b. 1579, m. Jone (Joan), dtr. of Thomas Walsh of Horsham, Sussex, and they had: Herbert, Thomas, Judith, Sarah, and Elizabeth.

Thomas married (2) about 1580, a daughter of Henry Radclyffe, Earl of Sussex in 1542 and Lord Lt. of Ireland, and wife, Elizabeth Howard, daughter of Thomas, Duke of Norfolk. Henry and Elizabeth Radc'lyffe's eldest son, Thomas, b. ca. 1525, was a soldier overseas, and became heir at the death of his father in February 1557. He began a petition to crown Lady Jane Grey, daughter of Henry Grey and Frances Brandon who was a daughter of Charles Brandon of Northumberland Co. and his third wife, Princess Mary, sister of Henry VIII, with whom he eloped, and was created Duke of Suffolk by Henry VIII. Lady Jane Grey was sixteen years old on the death of Edward VI, July 6, 1553, and did not want the crown, but she was made Queen of England on Feb. 3, 1554, and beheaded on Feb. 12, 1554, with her husband, amidst universal sympathy and compassion. Thomas Dykes and his second wife had: William, b. ca. 1582, d. 9 Sept. 1659, Rector of Franck Church in Sussex. He married Sarah Newman on 28 Oct. 1604, and had: John; Robert; William; Elizabeth; Dorothy, who married Sir George Hussey; Sarah; Ann; Mary, who married Richard Maynard of Sussex. Following is the line for his son, Richard:

1. THOMAS DYKES, b. ca. 1510, Cumberland Co., England, m. Isabel Pennington, dtr. of John and Mary (Huddleston) Pennington of Cumberland County, members of the King's household. Their son,

2. THOMAS DYKES, b. ca. 1545, prob. in London, Baronet of Kent and Sussex, lived in Pepenbury, Kent County. His arms: Or, three cinquefoils ca. By his first wife he had: John, b. ca. 1575; Robert, b. ca. 1577; Thomas, b. ca. 1579. By his second wife, Radclyffe, he had William, who married Sarah Newman on 28 Oct. 1604, and was rector of Franck in Sussex; and RICHARD:

- 3. RICHARD DYKES, b. ca. 1584, lived in London and was Captain of the Foot Soldiers. He had: HENRY and Richard:
- 4. HENRY DYKES, b. 1602, came to Virginia on the Primrose, age 33 years, on July 7, 1635, from London, Capt. Russell, Master. He married, possibly his second marriage, in 1647, Mary, the widow of Thomas Butcher, b. ca. 1602, in Wadhurst, Sussex, England, and died in Sept. 1646 in (now) New Kent County, Virginia. Mary died in 1651 and Henry Dykes was granted the administration of Thomas Butcher's estate. Henry Dykes was living in New Kent County, Va., in 1689 and was listed as a freeholder. He was over 64 years old to receive the non-taxable status. He probably had several sons who are listed in the surrounding areas of New Kent County. His son:
- 5. JAMES DYKES, a Colonel in the Virginia Colonial Militia, was b. ca. 1648-51 in York Co. (now New Kent Co.). He lived in Surry County and owned 400 acres there in 1704. He married ca. 1670, Margaret (David?). He was the executor of Anthony David's estate, a bachelor, and when he left for overseas in July 1676, he turned the administration of Anthony David's estate over to his wife, Margaret. They had William and HENRY:
- 6. HENRY DYKES, b. ca. 1671-5 in Surry County, died in Dec. 1725 in New Kent Co., Va., from an illness of several months. St. Peter's Parish church paid John Guiliam to care for Henry during his illness of smallpox? and making his coffin and burying him. For this John Guiliam received 230 pds. in tobacco. Henry Dykes was first entered into the church records on 19 Mar. 1703, or 1708 (pages too worn or missing). He married Mary Netherland, dtr. of John Netherland, a chuirch warden, and they had: Mary, b. 5 Nov. 170; Henry, bapt. 25 Feb. 1710/11; and JOHN:
- 7. JOHN DYKES, b. 26 Mar. 1716, New Kent Co., Va., moved to the Lunenburg area and was living in that part that formed Pittsylvania County in 1767. On Mar. 6, 1779, he and his wife, Agnes, purchased 520 acres from Rachel, widow of James Haggett of Guilford Co., N.C. This land was on Peter's Creek, the north side of the Dan River in Surry Co., N.C. The area is now in Stokes County. They sold off the 520 acres in two transactions by 1781 and moved to Tennessee. They had: James; Isham; and WILLIAM:
 - 8. WILLIAM DYKES, b. 1745-8, prob. Lunenburg Co., Va., married Susannah Stokes, b. 23 Sept. 1753, Lunenburg County, dtr. of David and Sarah (Montford) Stokes. David Stokes came from Charles City County and Sarah was born in Surry Co., Va., dtr. of (Joseph Montford,) son of Colonel Thomas Montfort of Surry and York Cos., Va. (The following pages gleaned from the existing records of William and Susannah and their descendants are not covered in this article. Ed.)
