# A Visit To Avery Curtis's "The Skillet"



Our May meeting of the Warren County Genealogical Association held a short meeting at the Administration office and headed out to visit Avery Curtis's "Skillet Rock".

Our crew arrived at 53 Mountain Top Lane in McMinnville and was greeted by Avery Curtis, who along with his wife Teresa own the property.

Our destination was just beginning as we loaded onto a trailer, pulled by his farm tractor, and began the final journey to the site. It is located about 200 meters southeast of the lake dam behind Mr. **Curtis'** 





house.

The skillet impression is known as Bedrock mortar and is a set of manmade circular depressions in a rock outcrop or naturally occurring slab. They were used by early people for grinding of grain, acorns or other food products. There are often a cluster of a considerable number of such holes in proximity indicating women gathered in teams to conduct food grinding in prehistoric cultures. Correspondingly the alternative name 'gossip stone' is sometimes applied, indicating the social

context of the food grinding activity. Typical dimensions of the circular indentations are approximately 12 centimeters in diameter by 10 centimeters deep, although a considerable range of depths of the cavities have been documented. The bedrock mortar has been identified in a number of world regions, but had been particularly intensely documented in the Americas. An alternative term for the bedrock mortar site is bedrock milling station. Source: Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.

#### Guidelines for WCGA Surname Registry

The purpose of the WCGA Surname Registry is to provide an index of surnames that are being researched by our members and other researchers. Our goal is to connect those who might be researching the same lines.

You may submit an entry for each surname that you are researching. Start with yourself and list your ancestor line for that surname for each generation that you have. Include the year of birth if that information is available. Example: John Berry Brown<sup>1</sup>, John Wesley Brown (b.1915)<sup>2</sup> (See the first example below).

If the line includes ancestors who are female, be sure you list both their maiden name and married name. Example: Zora Eva McKnight Mingle (b.1891) (see the second example below).

If the WCGA becomes aware that a person submitting entries is deceased, the address, phone number, and email will be removed and the entry flagged (see the third example below).

Include your name and address. If you prefer to be contacted by email, you may leave your phone number blank (or vice versa). Include the date that the information was submitted.





# Warren County – McMinnville First Pioneer Families

There's still time for you to make your connection by submitting copies of an official record linking you to Warren County before 1820. Those records can be birth, marriage,



death, probate or will, church, cemetery, funeral or obituary, land records, tax records, court, military records, census, newspaper, or Bible for each generation, including the applicant.

To qualify for a certificate, suitable for framing, the applicant must directly descend from an ancestor (male or female) who was in Warren County no later than the 1820 census (this includes the boundaries of the original formation of Warren County from White County).

There is a \$10 application processing fee + \$3.50 shipping for the certificates. All applications and verifying material become the property of the Warren County Genealogical Association.
