Material for Sanders Family file

Dear Matt,

I really enjoyed reading about your trip back to Grundy County, Tennessee, to look for your family and family roots. I wanted to help you so had my brother look your name up in a phone book and I wrote you a note on 1st February. Was not sure that was the right Matt Sanders—St. Louis is a mighty big place. But today I got a letter from Mrs. Dawn Brothers, editor of the Grundy Herald, giving me your address and it was the same as the one I had used on my small letter. So I know I have the right man!

I was born in Grundy County 85 years ago. Lived there the first 27 years and have kept up with folks there, pretty well ever since then. I help the Historical Society with the magazine they put out. The first one I did was working up small family histories on everyone in the county in 1850. Now I am doing the same thing with the folks there in the 1880 census. Its lots of work but makes it fairly easy for me to work up family histories for anyone as long as their families stayed in Grundy County. Yours stayed there all the time back to 1850. At least, this is how I figure your family went. Of course, I may be wrong. You thought Solomon was one of your ancestors and I don't agree with that. So we'll have to talk about that part. I do most of my work with the US census records and this is how your family looks to me.

In the 1920 census of Grundy County, I found Matt Sanders, 33 years old with wife, Mary, 28 years old, and son Ralph who was born the same month as the census taker came to their house. That would be in the summer of 1920—maybe June, July or August. The story in the Herald said Ralph is 80 now and your father was named Matt, so this surely is your family. Here is the marriage of Matt Sanders to Mary Meeks, 20 Dec 1918.

If Matt was 33 years old in 1920, he would be about 23 in 1910. So I went looking for a family with a son named Matt, 23 years old in 1910. Maybe its easier for you to see if I write them in this order:

Ages vary a lot in census records so we don't let that bother us as long as we can tell its the same family. The name Jordan is important here because as we go back farther, we can see that this boy was named after his grandfather, Wheeler's father. In this census, Matt, your father, should have been around 13 yrs old... where is he? Did your father use the middle initial J? Was his name really Matt Jordan Sanders? Maybe Mathew Jordan Sanders? I think the Jordan, 12 yrs old here, is your father.

There is no 1890 census so we have to jump 20 years to 1880 and here is your great grandfather, Jordan, with a son named Wheeler and he is your grandfather. And Wheeler has a brother Crawford and so he names a son after him.

I hope you'Il tell me why you think Solomon might be your ancestor. I find him only one time in Grundy County censuses. In 1860, he seems to live next door to Jordan. And he's 10 years younger than Jordan, so maybe they were brothers. Solomon's children had names like James, Nancy, Elizabeth, George, John, and William, none of the names in Jordan's line.

Ralph's mother was Mary Meeks. What was your mother's name? Were you born in Grundy County? I looked Fork Ridge up in the map and its in Claiborne County, up in northeastern Tennessee.

Well, Matt, I guess I have overwhelmed you with all this family stuff!!! Take your time and go over it again and again. This is 70 years of your family and goes up to time of Ralph's birth. I'll be glad to explain any of it that I can. I hope you'll write and let me know what you think of it.

Por more than 70 years, Matt Sanders, 73, lived in St. Louis, Missouri, totally unaware of the fact that he had a brother living in Tennessee.

All of that changed when Matt Sanders traveled to Grundy County in August of last year.

He hoped to find information about his father, Matt Sanders, and his father's family.

Heirs Provide New Stone for Pvt. Solomon Sanders' Grave

A Revolutionary War soldier was honored Sunday when heirs cleaned the little cemetery where he is buried and erected a Federal stone in place of one that the elements had reduced to several pieces.

Solomon Sanders, who came from Ireland to North Carolina, is Grundy County's only known Revolutionary War soldier. He lies in a peaceful grave at the foot of the mountain in Pelham Valley near Payne's Cove where he settled after receiving a land grant available to soldiers in the revolution.

"The old Sanders' Cemetery is in the Big Spring area at the head of Payne's Cove," says Mae Wilhelm of Estill Springs, an eighth-generation relative, who spearheaded the drive to place the marker.

In addition to the simple stone over Solomon's grave, a tall wooden sign has been erected with the cemetery's name. It's under a tall tree that stands in the middle of a field grown waist high with grass, but it's topped with small American flags and can be seen from the highway.

Helping with the work were James Street, Ed Henley, Edward Fults, Hershel Curtis, Charlie Curtis and Frank Kilgore of American Legion Post 74 in Tracy City.

Mrs. James Street coordinated the work Sunday, and Paul "Pepper" Sanders agreed to return with a

work crew to clear the rest of the cemetery of bushes and vines.

Descendants from Grundy, Franklin and Coffee counties were present, along with one from Bos-

Descendants of Solomon Sanders erected this stone Sunday to replace one destroyed over the years by the elements. Sanders, who lived from 1730 to 1830, fought in the Revolutionary War as a soldier in North Carolina.

Pvt. Solomon Sanders enlisted in the Army in November 1776 under Capt. McDaniel and Col. Frederick Hargett in the North Carolina Continental Line. He fought in the battles at Black River Bridge and Blemford's Bridge, according to papers held by Mrs. Wilhelm. He was discharged Nov. 10, 1779.

In 1826, at the age of 87, Sanders stated that he had always been a farmer, but was then unable to work. He was married to Mary Sanders, about 54, and had two daughters, Nancy, 18, and Sally, 16, and two sons, Jacob, 12, and Jordan, 11, dependent on him for support.

A Bounty Land Warrant noted that the man was indebted for the costs of a suit settled in the Circuit Court of Franklin County, Solomon Sanders vs Heirs of Poindexter Payne, in the sum of \$75 and \$40.


His schedule of property included 69 acres valued at \$343; two horses; two cows and calves; five or six hogs; three beds, furniture, knives, forks and plates.

Total value of Sanders' belongings was listed at \$485.

Mrs. Wilhelm, who has been collecting information on Solomon Sanders and his descendants for the past 26 years, says "he could be called the forefather of most all the Sanders' families in the mountainvalley and several states."

New Cemetery Sign

A nice wooden marker was installed Sunday at Sanders' Cemetery located at the foot of the mountain in Pelham Valley's Paynes Cove section. Legionnaires and descendants of Solomon Sanders gathered to honor the county's only known Revolutionary War soldier, who is buried there.

Seven children preceded her in death as did two brothers and five sisters. In addition to the survivors named there are several grandshildren and great grandshildren.

Funeral service will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Tracy City, Yenn., with burial in Orange cemetery there.

Jacob Dykes, 68, Retired Miner, Dies Tuesday

Jacob Dykes, 68. of this city, who had been ailing for three weeks, died at his home at 4:50 Tuesday morning.

Dykes who had been ill several years underwent an operation last Spring and a leg was amputated. He had been bedfast since.

Dykes was well known for his unselfish love of his fellow man and his big hearted generosity. Besides raising a large family he helped raise several outside the family and many were helped along the road of life through his kindness.

He was a member of the Coulter-, ville local, Progressive Miners, and had been a miner for the past 50 years.

A Remembrance

Mr. Ralph Sanders: Life in the 20th Century

By David Patter

The 20th century has seen more inventions, progress, and improvement in the quality of human life, than all the previous history of mankind combined.

Mr. Ralph Sanders of Palmer, has lived every year of this century, plus some of the 19th century.

Ralph Sanders, who was born in Payne's Cove, Pelham, Tennessee, a little more or a little less than 91 years ago, now resides in Palmer, Tennessee, with daughter Margie Ramey. Ralph is the seventh born of thirteen children to the late Wheeler and Nancy Nunley Sanders. As a youngster of 7, Ralph and his family moved to the mountains of Grundy County. A first cousin, Dick Meeks, moved them in a mule-drawn wagon up the mountain through Monteagle and Tracy City to Clouse Hill. The family built a new house in Wheeler Town in the Sweeton Hill area of Coalmont. They moved into their new home on August 7, 1912.

Ralph attended the old Sweeton Hill School, where he was taught by Edith Ponry and a Mrs. Claudia Aylor Parson, who now lives in Tullahoma. At that time, school was in session three months each year.

At the age of thirteen, he began working in the coal mines at Coalmont for a group of independent contractors, Ed Hall, Harris, and Scruggs, at the old Summers Opening. He worked for seventy-five cents per day firing an air shaft which pulled smoke out of the mines.

In 1927, he came to Palmer to work in the coal mines. During the stock market crash, he was living in Tilden, Illinois, where his in-laws, Jacob and Martha Dykes lived. He had married their oldest daughter, Ola, in Coalmont in 1923, with Squire Hicks Warren officiating at the Ernest Meeks home. Ralph, Ola, and sons, Alfred "Foxie" and Jay W., followed the Dykes family to southern Illinois in search of work. Their third son, "Pepper" was born there. While there, Ralph worked in shaft coal mines, 218 feet deep in the ground. The screener belt burned closing the mine down for a spell. Ralph and his father-in-law worked in a walnut tree orchard. The juice from the tree was used to make stain, and the tree was used to make furniture. After that, he worked in an animal slaughter house for Tony and Amil Lehr. The family was called back to Tennessee due to the sickness of his father. After coming back to Tennessee, he worked on the gymnasium at Palmer for Mr. E.J. Cunningham during President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal Program and the W.P.A. days.

Ralph and Ola raised 6 of 7 children born to them. Alfred "Foxie", died at the age of 43, twenty years ago. The next born, Jay W., a former member of the Grundy County Court, lives in Gruetli-Laager, with his wife June. He is retired from mining and the T.V.A. Charles "Cotton" serves as Chairman of the Grundy County Democratic Party, and is a member of the Grundy County Court, and the Board of the Exceptional Citizens of Grundy County. He lives with his wife, Betty Sue, in Palmer, and works at the Signal Mountain Cement Plant. "Pepper" is retired from coal mining and construction work and resides in Palmer. Margie also lives in Palmer and teaches at Swiss Memorial School. Jo Ann lives in Tullahoma with her husband, Charles Kimbril, and works in their security and restaurant business. Ralph has 13 grandchildren and 10 stepgrandchildren. He has 11 great-grandchildren and 11 step-great-grandchildren.

Ralph is a member of the First Baptist Church of Palmer, where he still attends church regularly. He is well known for his generosity and his cooking-especially banana cake and egg custard.

"Mr. Ralph and his entire family have always been good-hearted people, willing to help others," Palmer historian David Patton added.

Money was hard to come by just before the Great Depression of 1929. A 25-pound flour sack became a shirt for Ola's boys or a dress for the girls. But the family was

generous to those in need. On one occasion when the only area industry, the company coal mine, was not operating, food was in very short supply. A neighbor had no milk to feed to her newborn baby. Ola had seven cans of condensed milk. She asked her six children if they wished to give this milk to the woman to feed the baby. All six voted to give the milk to the family in need even though they had no money to buy more milk.

Ola's nature was very quiet and reserved, but she could be a woman of action when the need arose. One summer her boys slipped off and went to the "Blue Hole" by the "Big Mines" to swim. Ola walked about two miles to the "Blue Hole", spanked the boys with a switch, and brought them home.

Although Ola only completed the fifth grade, she was an avid reader and passed her love of reading on to her children. Along with reading, Ola enjoyed embroidering, crocheting and growing flowers. Very few people could compare with her skill and accomplishment in the kitchen. She made biscuits that would melt in your mouth. After their marriage, Ola and Ralph worked side by side cooking Southern fried chicken and chicken and dumplings. For them and their family, the custom was to have fried steak, chicken, pork chops, biscuits, and gravy for breakfast. Visitors always loved to come and eat from their table. Ola and Ralph never had a living room suite until their girls were grown, but they had one of the nicest dining room suites that could be bought.

Ola was a good housewife and mother, and family was very important to her. She was much admired by her family and friends.

A Grundy County Family: Ralph and Ola Dykes Sanders By David Patton and Margie Ramey

A Remembrance: Mr. Ralph Sanders: Life in the 20th Century By David Patton (Reprinted from an article published in the late 1980s)

The 20th century has seen more inventions, progress, and improvements in the quality of human life than all the previous history of mankind combined.

Mr. Ralph Sanders of Palmer has lived every year of this century, plus some of the 19th century.

Ralph Sanders, who was born in Payne's Cove, Pelham, Tennessee, a little more or a little less than 91 years ago, now resides in Palmer, Tennessee, with daughter Margie Ramey. Ralph is the seventh born of thirteen children to the late Wheeler and Nancy Nunley Sanders. As a youngster of seven, Ralph and his family moved to the mountains of Grundy County. A first cousin, Dick Meeks, moved them in a mule-drawn wagon up the mountain through Monteagle and Tracy City to Clouse Hill. The family built a new house in Wheeler Town in the Sweeton Hill area of Coalmont. They moved into their new home on August 7, 1912.

Ralph attended the old Sweeton Hill School where he was taught by Edith Ponry and a Mrs. Claudia Aylor Parson, who now lives in Tullahoma. At that time, school was in session three months each year.

At the age of 13, he began working in the coal mines at Coalmont for a group of independent contractors, Ed Hall, Harris, and Scruggs at the old Summers Opening. He worked for seventy-five cents per day firing an air shaft which pulled smoke out of the mines.

In 1927, he came to Palmer to work in the coal mines. During the stock market crash, he was living in Tilden, Illinois, where his in-laws, Jacob and Martha Dykes lived. He had married their oldest daughter, Ola, in 1923, with Squire Hicks Warren officiating at the Ernest Meeks home. Ralph, Ola, and sons Alfred (Foxie) and Jay W. followed the Dykes family to southern Illinois in search of work. Their third son, "Pepper", was born there. While there, Ralph worked in shaft coal mines, 218 feet deep in the ground. The screener belt burned, closing the mine down for a spell. Ralph and his father-in-law worked in a walnut tree orchard. The juice from the tree was used to make stain, and the tree was used to make furniture. After that, he worked in an animal slaughter house for Tony and Amil Lehr. The family was called back to Tennessee due to the sickness of his father. After coming back to Tennessee, he worked on the gymnasium in Palmer for Mr. E. J. Cunningham during President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal Program and the W.P.A. Days.

Ralph and Ola raised six of the seven children born to them. Alfred "Foxie" died at the age of 43, twenty years ago. The next born, Jay W., a former member of the Grundy County Court, lives in Gruetli-Laager with his wife June. He is retired from mining and the T.V.A. Charles "Cotton" serves as Chairman of the Grundy County Democratic

Party, and is a member of the Grundy County Court and the Board of Exceptional Citizens of Grundy County. He lives with his wife, Betty Sue, in Palmer and works at the Signal Mountain Cement Plant. "Pepper" is retired from coal mining and construction work and resides in Palmer. Margie also lives in Palmer and teaches at Swiss Memorial School. JoAnn lives in Tullahoma with her husband, Charles Kimbril, and works in their security and restaurant business. Ralph has thirteen grandchildren and ten step-grandchildren. He has eleven great-grandchildren and eleven step-great-grandchildren.

Ralph is a member of the First Baptist Church of Palmer, where he still attends church regularly. He is well known for his generosity and his cooking, especially banana cake and egg custard.

"Mr. Ralph and his entire family have always been good-hearted people, willing to help others," Palmer historian David Patton added.

Memories of My Mother, Ola Sanders

Ola Dykes was born on December 19, 1903, in Tracy City, Tennessee. She was the oldest of thirteen children, seven girls and six boys. When Ola was young, the Dykes family lived on the side of Dunlap Mountain. At some time during Ola's early childhood, the family moved to Whitwell, Tennessee, where one of the baby boys is buried. Ola's family also lived in Tracy City, where her father often took her to revival camp meetings. When Ola was around nine or ten years old, the family moved to Coalmont.

Three of Ola's brothers died in infancy. Ola often told her children about a strange occurrence that seemed connected to the death of one of the boys. For three days before her baby brother Douglas died, an unoccupied rocking chair in the home rocked continually by itself. Although the family would physically stop the chair from rocking, it would begin again on its own.

Ola married Ralph Sanders in 1923. In the mid-1920s Ralph, Ola and their two sons Alfred and Jay lived at Roddy Springs. Times were hard. The house at Roddy Springs had big cracks between the floorboards, and snakes would sometimes raise their heads between these cracks.

Ola became separated from her parents when they moved to southern Illinois in 1924. Since Ralph and Ola had no automobile, visits to Illinois were rare. Her cousins Goldie Lockhart Young and "Sis" Lockhart Bean became just like sisters to her and helped fill the void. Her neighbors George and Margaret Tate also helped the young family. In later years, Ralph would hire Eston Cagle to drive the whole family in his car to visit Ola's parents.

Around 1925, the family moved to Palmer. Ola raised her family of four boys and two girls in a little three-room company house in the section of Palmer called Burnt Orchard. For a while they lived in the house with John and Lizzie Cleek.
