The cedars of which it was constructed cost 13 cents per foot at some place on the Lebanon branch of the railroad. (these are not the cedars of Lebanon), and were huge trees ranging from 35 to 45 feet long of great circumference.

# "SEQUACHEE" to "SEQUATCHIE" (Changing the town name) September 19, 1900

Post Office Department, Office of the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Stamp Division Washington, D. C.**Gustafson Bros**. Mfg. Co. Sequatchie, Tennessee Sirs:

In reply to your letter of September 14, I have to inform you that the Post Master at Sequatchie ordered your special request envelopes to be printed returnable to "Sequatchie", because he was obliged to do so in view of the Department's rule requiring that the official orthograph of the postoffice as published in the Postal Guide be followed in all requisitions for printed return cards. So as long as the official spelling remains "Sequatchie," this office cannot, under the rule print cards returnable to "Sequachee."

If the patrons of Sequatchie postoffice desire it's name to be changed to "Sequachee," I beg to advise that a petition to that effect, signed by the patrons generally, be forwarded to the fourth Assistant Postmaster General.

Your Postmaster is to-day directed to return to this office the 500 special-request envelopes furnished for you with the name

of the postoffice printed "Sequatchie," If you decline to accept them, and the will be given credit at there postage value.

Advantage was then immediately taken of the implied hint in the letter and the following petition was then circulated and signed by our citizens generally, only four parties who were given a chance to sign refusing.

To the Hon., the fourth Assistant Postmaster General, U.S.A.

The petition of the undersigned citizens of Sequachee, Marion County, Tenn., residents, property owners in said town of Sequachee, and patrons of the Postoffice in said Sequachee, respectfully represents.

That the said town was established as Sequachee, July 1, 1890, and has continued until this date, and all deeds and conveyances of property were made as being in Sequachee and so recorded, and the Postoffice of Sequachee was duly established July 1, 1890.

That the postoffice continued as Sequachee until 1897 when without any request on the part of any of the people or notice to them the name was changed. No necessity
